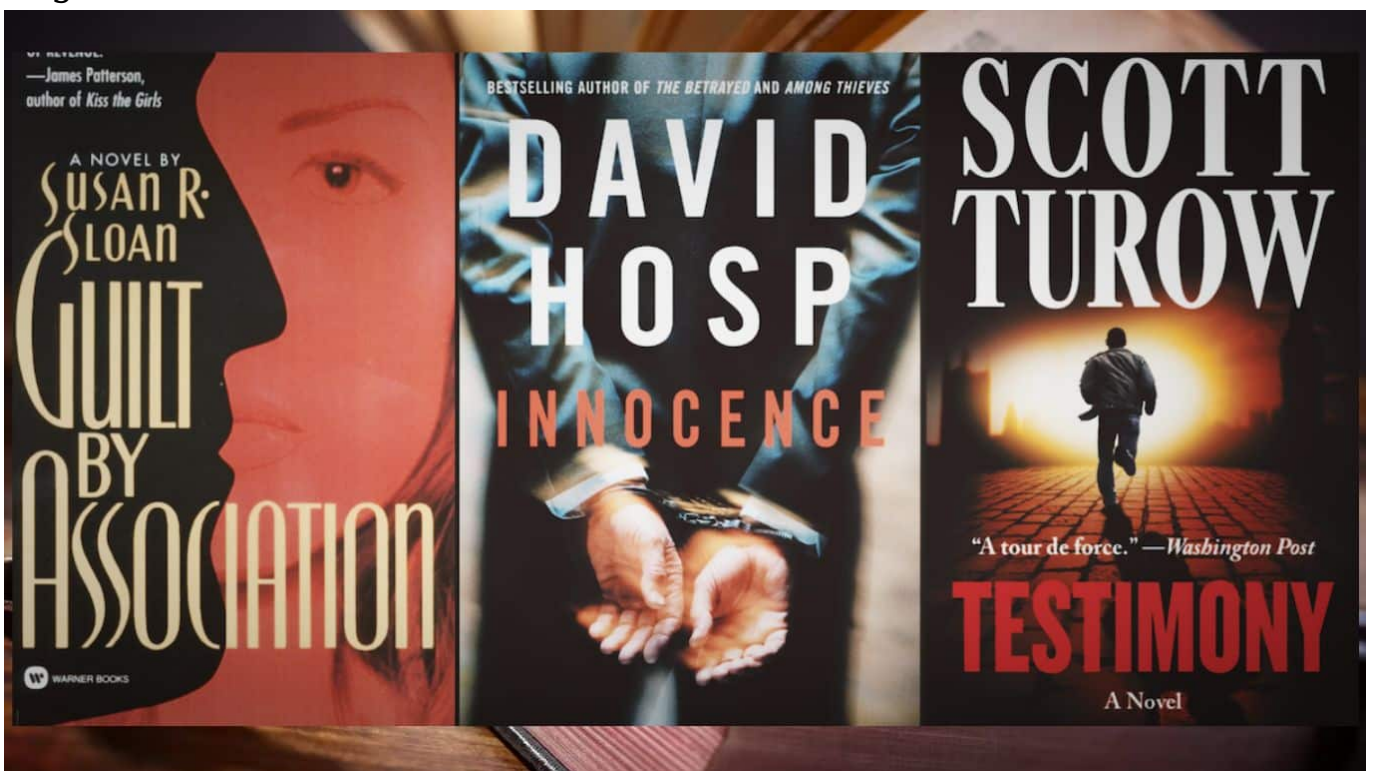
## Noir Fiction

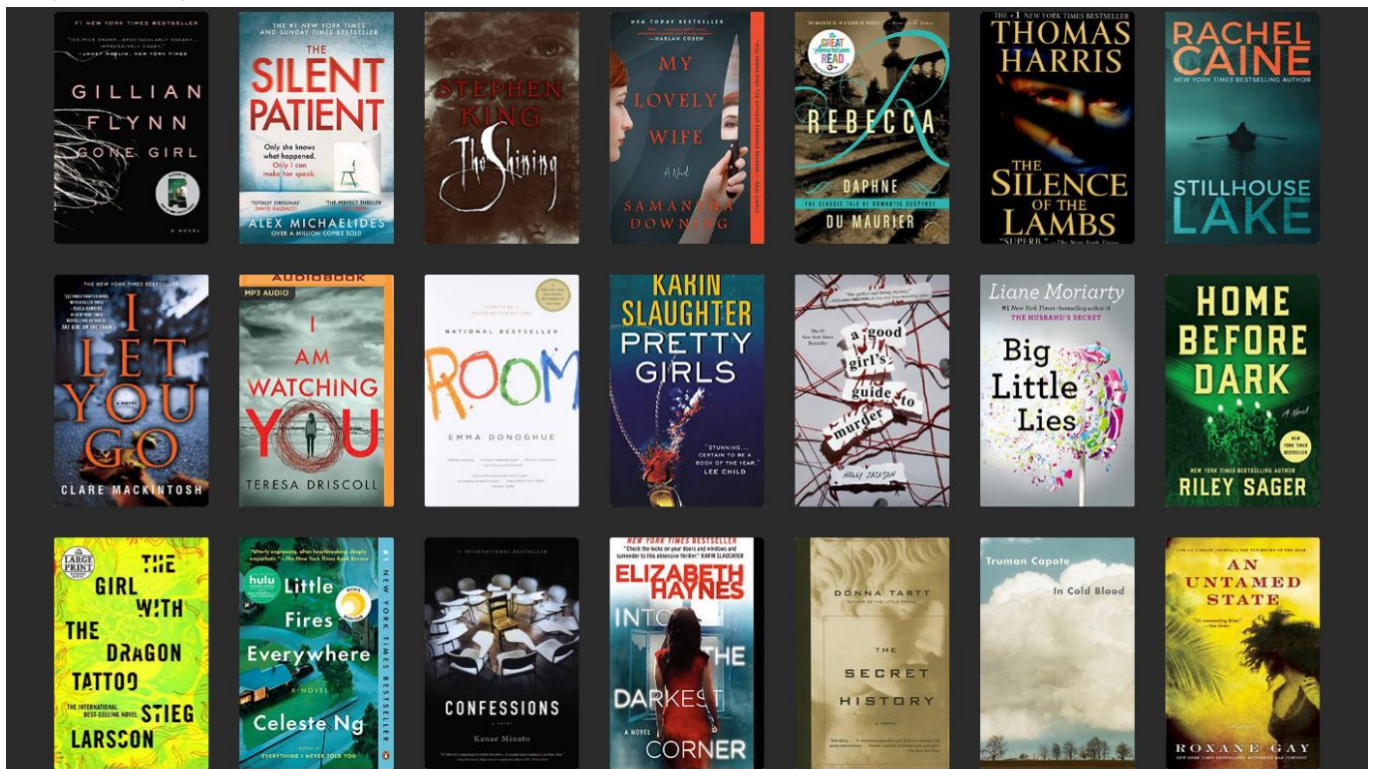
