

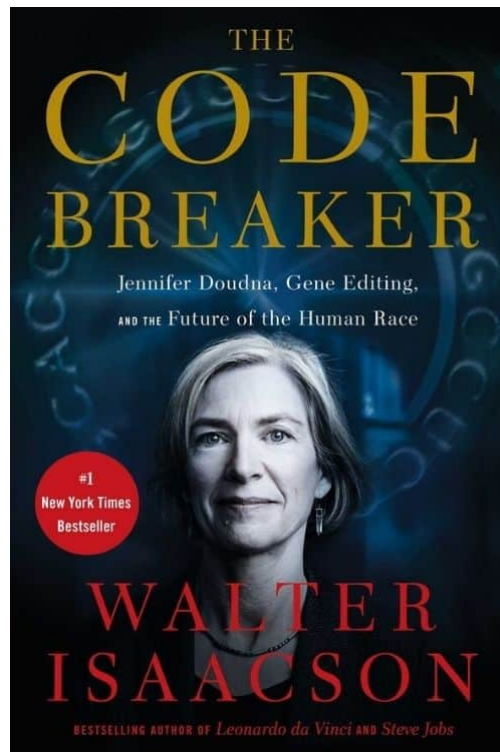

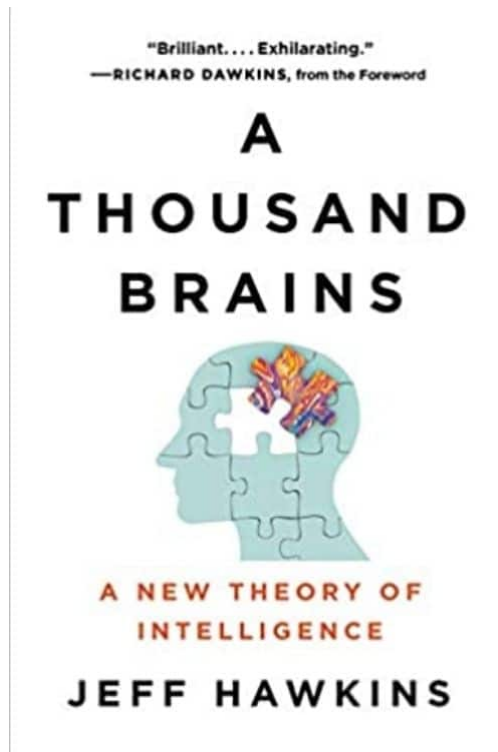

A Thousand Brains: A New Theory of Intelligence written by **Jeff Hawkins**

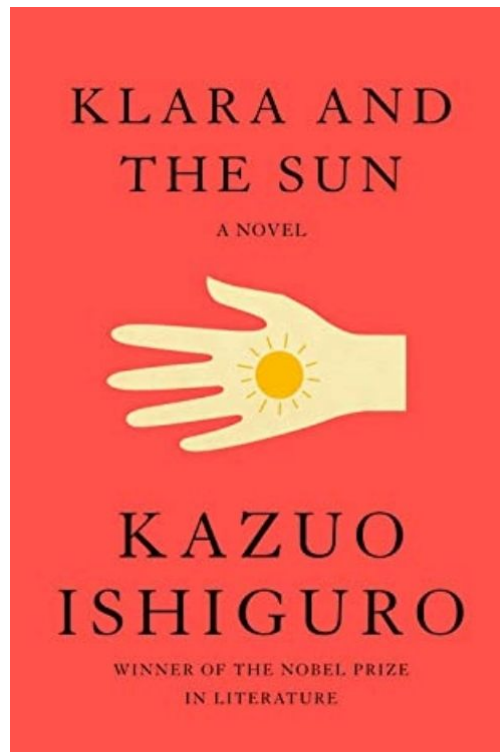

Klara and the Sun written by **Kazuo Ishiguro**

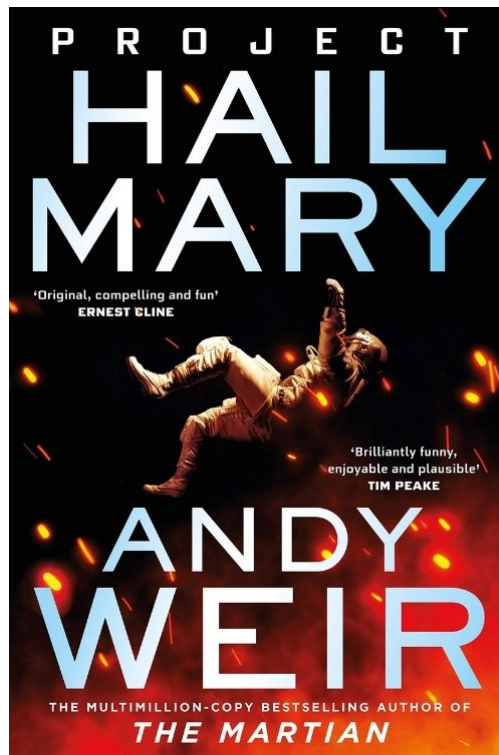


5 Books Recommended by Bill Gates for Winter Holidays of 2021 (Klara and the Sun)

Project Hail Mary written by **Andy Weir**

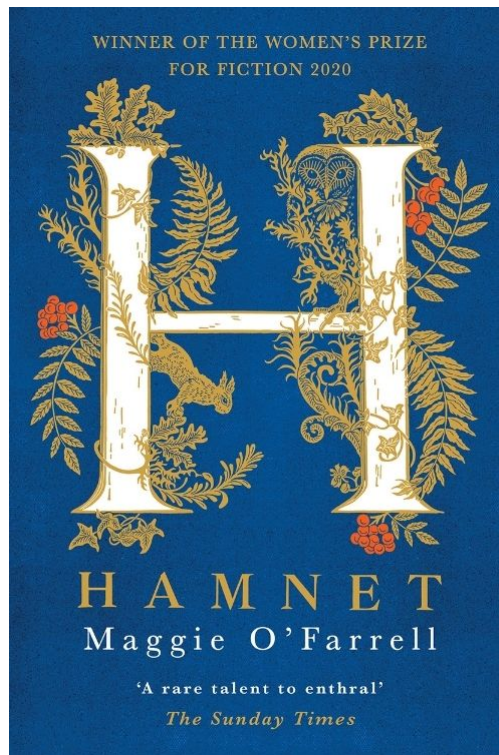
