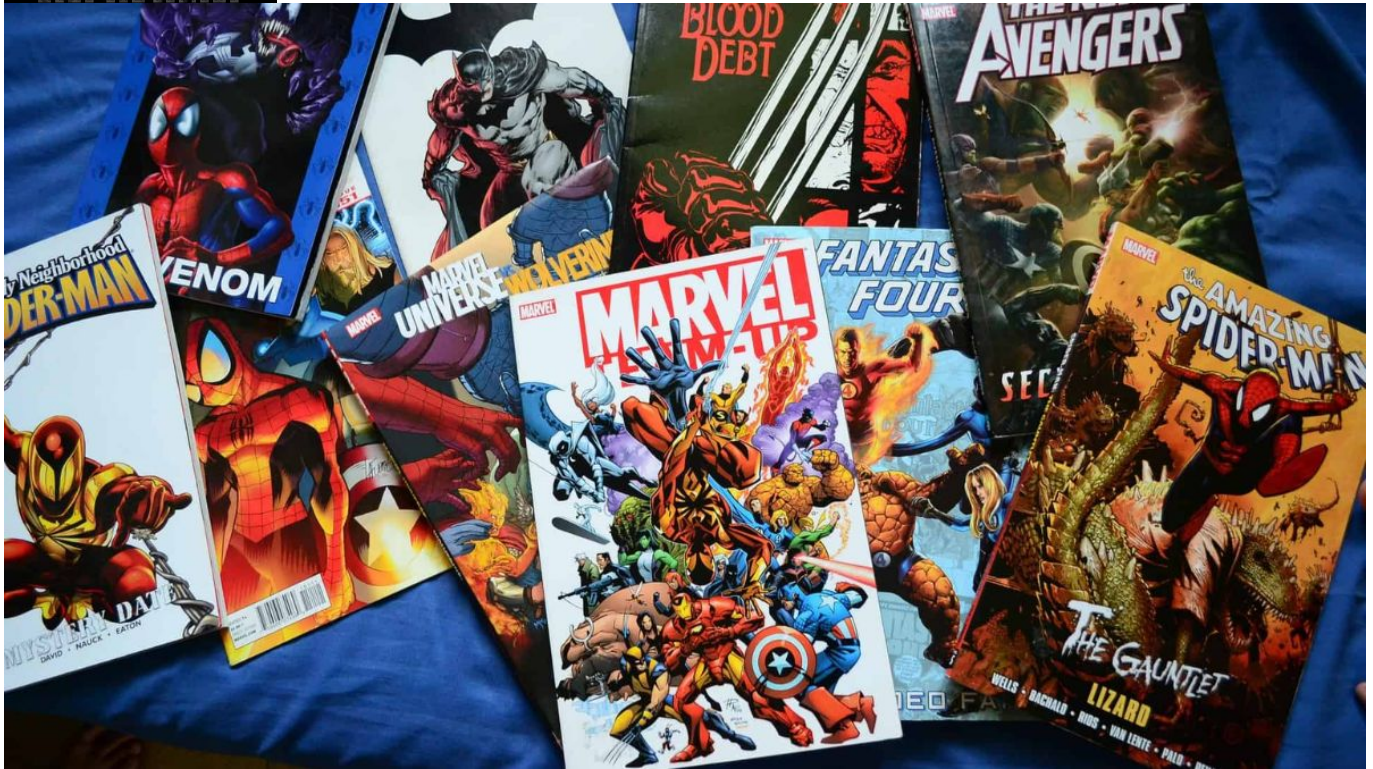

Marvel Comics: The House of Ideas

Marvel Comics, currently known as the home of iconic superheroes such as Spider-Man, the X-Men, and the Avengers, began its journey in 1939 as Timely Publications. Founded by Martin Goodman, Timely’s first publication was “Marvel Comics” #1, featuring the first appearances of characters like the Human Torch (not the Fantastic Four member) and Namor the Sub-Mariner. It wasn’t until the 1960s that the company, now known as Marvel Comics, would redefine the superhero genre. Under the leadership of figures such as Stan Lee, Jack Kirby, and Steve Ditko, Marvel introduced complex characters who dealt with real-world issues, setting the stage for its future success.

DC Comics: The Origin of Superheroes

DC Comics, originally named National Allied Publications, is the birthplace of the modern superhero. Founded in 1934 by Malcolm Wheeler-Nicholson, DC is the oldest major comic book publisher in the United States. The release of “Action Comics” #1 in 1938, featuring the debut of Superman, marked a pivotal moment in comic book history, introducing the world to the superhero genre. Batman followed a year later in “Detective Comics” #27. Over the decades, DC Comics has expanded its universe with a vast array of superheroes, including Wonder Woman, the Flash, and Green Lantern, establishing the foundation for countless stories and adaptations.



Dark Horse Comics: A Haven for Creators

Founded in 1986 by Mike Richardson, Dark Horse Comics emerged from a small comic book store in Oregon. It has since grown into one of the largest independent comic publishers in the U.S. Dark Horse has built its reputation on offering a creative haven for writers and artists, allowing them to retain the copyrights to their creations. This approach has led to the publication of critically acclaimed series such as “Hellboy,” “Sin City,” and “300.” Dark Horse also licenses and publishes content from popular franchises like “Star Wars,” “Aliens,” and “Buffy the Vampire Slayer.”

Image Comics: Revolutionizing Creator Ownership

In 1992, a group of high-profile Marvel Comics artists, frustrated with the lack of ownership over their creations, banded together to form Image Comics. This new publisher would allow creators to publish their material while retaining the rights to their work. Founders Todd McFarlane, Jim Lee, Rob Liefeld, Marc Silvestri, Erik Larsen, Jim Valentino, and Whilce Portacio introduced a new era in comic publishing, emphasizing creator-owned content. Image’s launch titles, including “Spawn,” “Youngblood,” “WildC.A.T.s,” and “Savage Dragon,” were commercial successes, cementing Image’s place in comic book history.

IDW Publishing: From Art Books to Major Comics Publisher

IDW Publishing began its journey in 1999, founded by Ted Adams, Alex Garner, Kris Oprisko, and Robbie Robbins. Notable titles include adaptations and continuations of popular TV series such as “Star Trek,” “Doctor Who,” and “Transformers,” as well as original series like “Locke & Key” by Joe Hill and Gabriel Rodríguez. IDW’s commitment to diverse and innovative content has made it a significant player in the comics industry.
