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Frederick II Regains Control over Holy Land (1229)

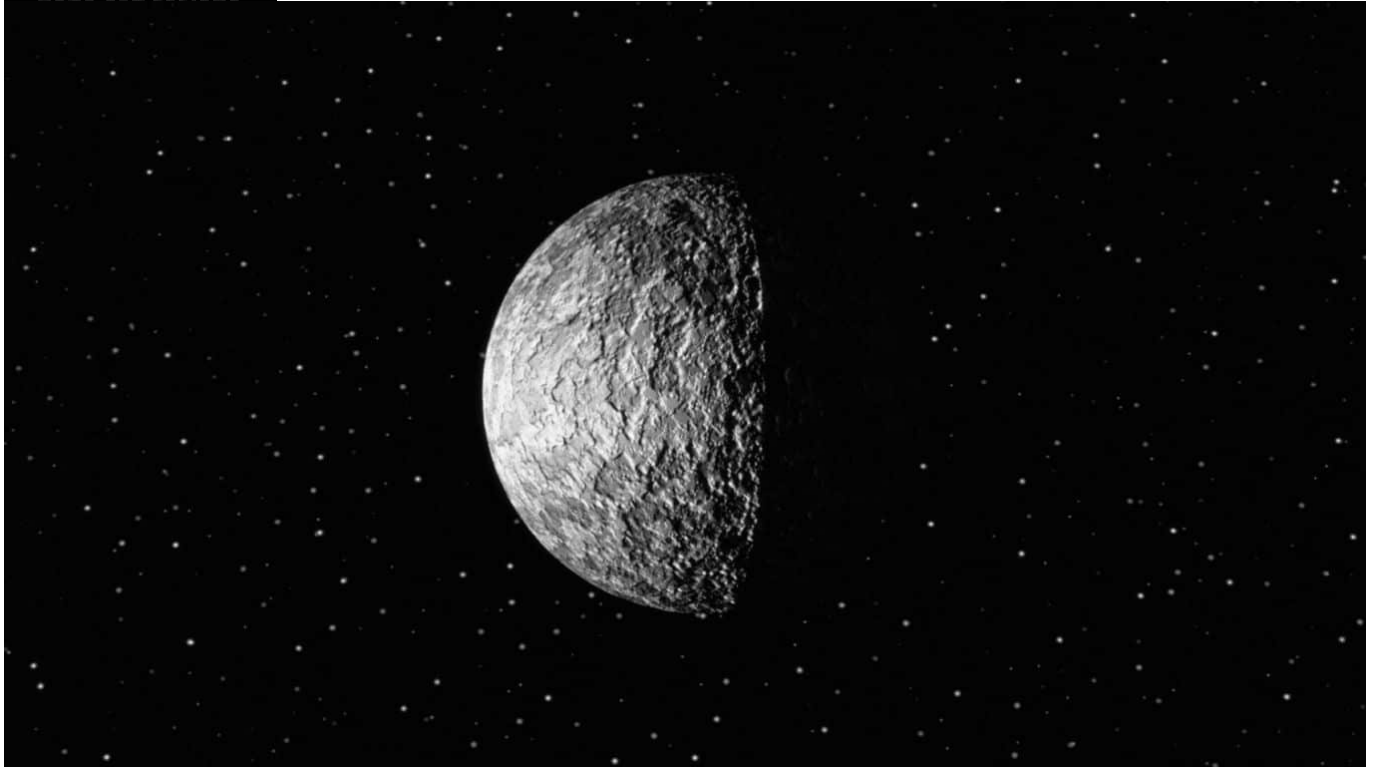
India Home Rule Society Founded (1905)
