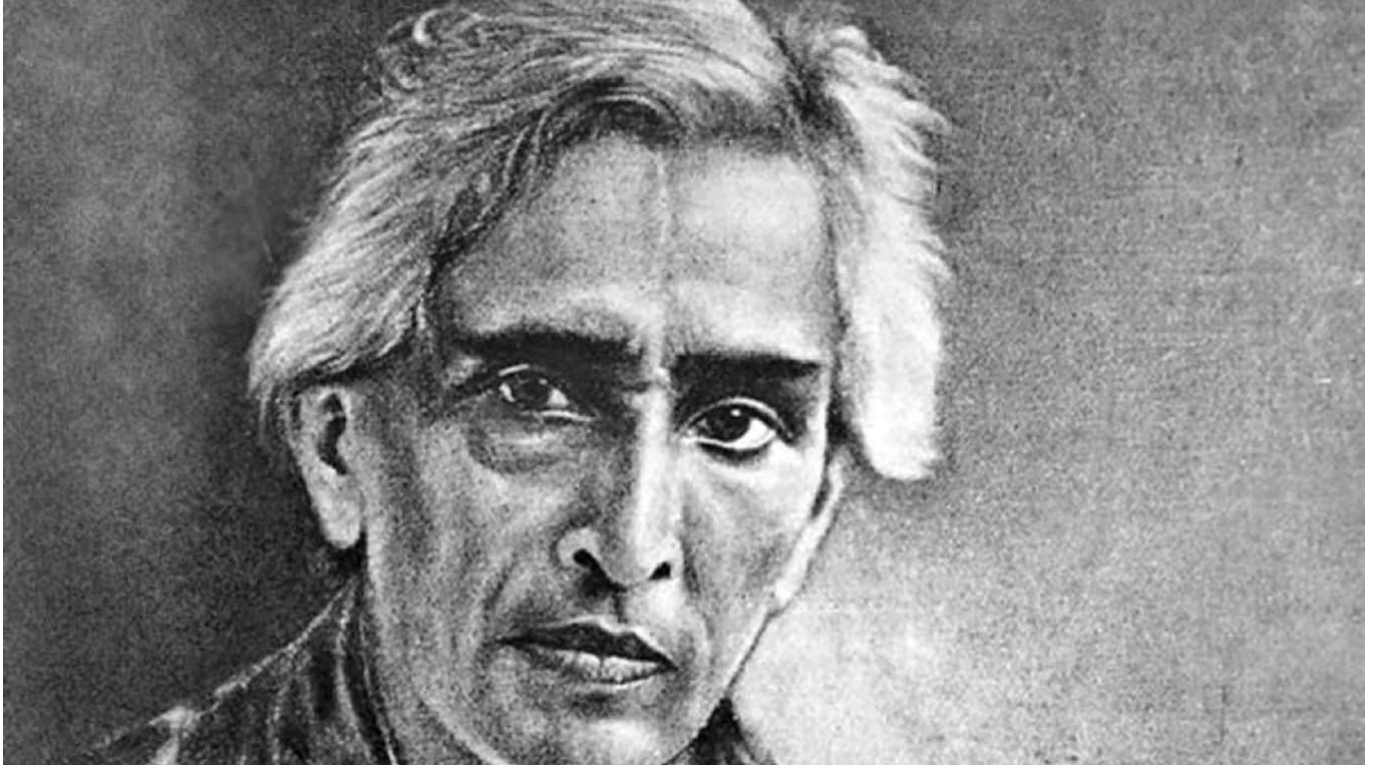
Rabindranath Tagore

Born in Calcutta (now Kolkata) on May 7, 1861, he is considered one of India's most notable literary figures. As a prolific writer, he created an array of works including poems, songs, plays, novels, and essays in both Bengali and English. In 1913, Tagore became the first non-European to receive the Nobel Prize in Literature for his collection of poems "Gitanjali." Some of his other well-known works include "The Home and the World," "Gora," and "The Post Office." To this day, he continues to be a significant influence in Indian literature and culture.

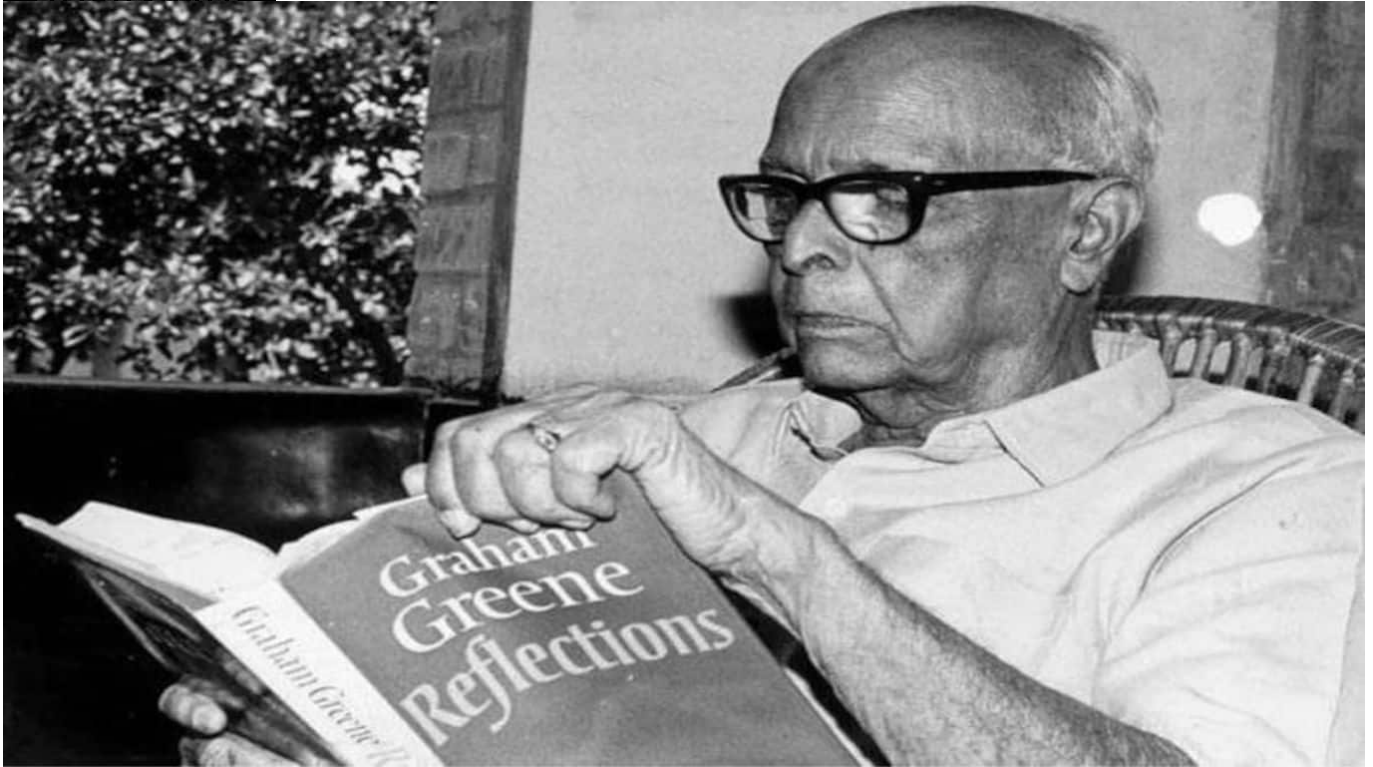
Ruskin Bond
